Re: El Paso County 2022 PPRTA Proposed Budget Summary

El Paso County Capital Program (2005-2014)

The proposed 2022 PPRTA capital budget for the 2005-2014 Capital Projects is \$305,315.

The *Marksheffel South* project was substantially completed in 2017 and is in closeout mode. Project closeout activities include construction of stormwater related items for permit closeout and is expected to be completed by the end of 2021. Any remaining funds will be included in a line-item transfer in early 2022.

The *Meridian Road Extension Project* is under construction and is being coordinated with the 2015-2024 PPRTA Capital Project at New Meridian/US-24 and the federally funded Falcon Park and Ride project. Construction is expected to be completed in early 2022. Any remaining funds will be included in line-item transfer to Marksheffel Road project, led by the City of Colorado Springs.

El Paso County Capital Program (2015-2024)

The 2022 budget for the 2015-2024 Capital program from El Paso County is \$21,400,556 which includes the El Paso County allocation of \$21,185,509 and \$15,047 to be allocated to EPC from Town of Ramah, \$0 to be allocated from the City of Colorado Springs, and \$200,000 to be allocated from the City of Manitou Springs for prior advancement of funds. Together with the 2021 carryover forecast of \$48,216,362, the total 2022 budget is anticipated to be \$69,416,918. The 2021 revenue carryover does not reflect current encumbered funds.

2022 is the eighth year of revenues for the PPRTA Capital Extension projects that were approved by the voters to start in 2015. El Paso County has made progress on several projects that are identified in the 2015-2024 PPRTA Capital Ballot reauthorization. The eighth year of revenues will be used to continue projects that are already underway in the construction phase, to progress design projects into the construction phase, and to further design efforts on all remaining projects. Two El Paso County projects are anticipated to be advertised for construction in late 2021 and three projects are anticipated to progress to construction in 2022 which may require some adjustment of the anticipated 2022 revenues for budget increases/line-item transfers. El Paso County typically only requests budget increases once actual construction costs are known to minimize multiple budget adjustments. Black Forest Road and Tutt Boulevard are projects that are joint effort with and led by the City of Colorado Springs.

El Paso County has advanced significant funds for the West Colorado Avenue Project on behalf of the City of Colorado Springs (\$7,771,230) and the City of Manitou Springs (\$858,998). El Paso County and The City of Colorado Springs are planning on a complete offset of costs between the Black Forest Road and the West Colorado Avenue. It is El Paso County's understanding that the City of Manitou Springs will allocate \$200,000 in 2022 to El Paso County for "payback" of Colorado Avenue fund advancement.

Additionally, the City of Manitou Springs advanced their projects in 2015-2016 with additional funding from El Paso County in the amount \$622,279 and it is anticipated that they will budget the remaining amounts owed in 2021-2024 to El Paso County to "payback" the remaining balance of the advancement

El Paso County Maintenance Program

The proposed PPRTA maintenance budget allocation for 2022 is \$14,099,883, per guidance from PPRTA. Based on current projections, it is estimated there will be maintenance carryover from 2021 of approximately \$7,313,542, which is encumbered but unspent. The total PPRTA funded maintenance budget for 2022, including carryover, is expected to be \$21,413,425

As in the past, our maintenance program will include concrete repairs to curb, gutter and sidewalk for roads planned to be paved in the following year-2023; as well as, customer service requests requiring concrete repair or maintenance; pavement maintenance to protect and extend the life of paved surfaces including overlays, chip seals, crack sealing, striping, shouldering, and patching; gravel road maintenance and rehabilitation; and other maintenance needs such as condition evaluation of our pavements, signal and bridge maintenance that are identified during the maintenance program evaluation process. With recent budget amendments, El Paso County is looking at ways to use unspent carryover money in 2021.

The process for prioritizing paved roads for repair and rehabilitation will remain a cost benefit analysis per our Pavement Management Analysis (PMA), which annually evaluates the entire paved road system based on funds available.

As part of the 2021 PPRTA Budget, the maintenance program included funding for a concrete box culvert (CBC) on Marksheffel Road North between Carefree Circle North and Barnes Road that will be coordinated with PPRTA improvements to Marksheffel that will be sponsored by the city of Colorado Springs. The carryover from previous PPRTA budgets of \$1,500,000 is planned to cover this CBC.

The specific elements within each category and the allocation of the available budget by category are evaluated during the fourth quarter of the year proceeding the program year. During this process, we will also evaluate the cost effectiveness of contracting all or part of the needed services versus purchasing materials to accomplish the program while utilizing County forces and equipment to perform the work. El Paso County maintenance contracts will be brought forth for consideration in accordance with established PPRTA BOD Policies.
